

LEARNING ABOUT THE POWER OF MYTH:



Enjoying Six Conversations between Joseph Campbell and Bill Moyers

This new group will be watching the fascinating series of interviews of the renowned scholar Joseph Campbell by journalist Bill Moyers, recorded 25 years ago in 1990, called "The Power of Myth". This series became one of the most enduringly popular programs ever aired on PBS. These two men discuss myths as metaphors for human

experience and the path to transcendence, touching on topics as diverse as world religion, heroic figures, and pop culture. This new group is an outgrowth of the recently concluded Exploring Elderhood group.

There will be six meetings and each will be two hours, from 11:00 am to 1:00 pm. The meetings will be organized as follows: (1) each of the six sections of "The Power of Myth" will be shown for one hour: and then (2) participants will have a discussion of what was explored for another hour. A study guide will provide the focus for the discussions. Participants are encouraged to bring lunch to enjoy during the second hour of each meeting.

The first meeting will be introductory. At the conclusion of the first meeting, participants will be asked to commit to being part of the group for the five remaining meetings. This group will meet on the first and third Tuesdays of September, October and November. The dates are: 9/1 and 9/15; 10/6 and 10/20; and 11/3 and 11/17.

STORY CIRCLE: A STORYTELLING WORKSHOP SERIES

Often, the best way to unearth a story is by talking it through with a group of delighted listeners. In this six-session Story Circle, we'll use the tools of storytelling to discover and develop our stories. If your life is rich with experiences that you'd like to turn into tellable tales, this is the group for

you. If you love to invent new worlds, we'll play improvisation games to strengthen your imagination and then unleash it! Whether your goal is a spoken performance or a written story, you'll develop new material here. (You can even have your story recorded and emailed to you, to make it easier to transcribe.) Meeting weekly for 90 minutes, participants have an allotted time to discover their story by telling it aloud, while we listen delightedly. It would be great if you could attend the whole series, and drop-ins are also welcome.

Led by **Ruth Halpern**, who has been teaching storytelling workshops and performing for over 20 years. Working with business people, performing artists, elders and children, Ruth helps people become the heroes of their own life stories. Her repertoire of games and exercises includes tools from theatre, improvisation, storytelling, and make-believe. She creates safe story circles in which all of our stories can be shared. As a performer, Ruth tells a mixture of world folktales, personal stories, and improvised stories made up on the spot. Her audiotape, *She Set Out to Seek Her Fortune*, won a Parents' Choice Gold Award. The *LA Times* says Ruth Halpern is "A spell-binding master storyteller."

San Francisco Village invites you to learn about the history of fly fishing, with an emphasis on the evolution of fly fishing for women. Learn how women infiltrated a sport dominated by men, and how the community accepted them. Finally, we will look at the prominence of women in all aspects of fly fishing. Presented by SF Village Member Fanny Krieger, who founded the Golden West Women Fly Fishers as well as the International Women Fly Fishers, and has been inducted into the Northern California Council/Federation of Fly Fishers Hall of Fame for her contributions in the

world of fly fishing.

Fanny's Bio:

Fanny was born and raised in France and is a Holocaust survivor. In November 1943, her parents and sister were taken by the Germans and sent to Auschwitz. At 17, she came to America when it became

obvious that her family was not coming back. After spending five years in New York, Fanny moved on to Houston, Texas where she met her future husband Mel, a passionate fly fisherman. Fanny knew nothing of fishing, so she got Mel to take her on a fishing date. And so started a new life. Fanny is responsible for the GWWF Jo Clark Youth Fund, which allows 6 to 7 youngsters to spend a week at The Fish Camp learning to fly cast and fly fish, with great excitement. Fanny is also a certified casting instructor.





AT THE MOVIES WITH RALPH BEREN

About Elly



Picture a group of Iranian men trying to dig out a car stuck in the mud with little chance of succeeding. This is an excellent metaphor for the story that unfolds in the film *About Elly*. A group of close friends, former classmates and their families, get together for a relaxing vacation on the Caspian Sea. The trip is planned by Sepideh, who brings along her daughter's kindergarten teacher, Elly, in order to introduce her to Ahmad, a divorced friend, visiting from Germany. The lies they tell one another, and the disappearance of Elly, are the centerpiece of the film.

What happened to her? Did she just leave without telling anyone? Did she drown? All kinds of stories are made up to explain her whereabouts. We find out along the way that Elly is engaged to a man she despises, which only Sepideh knows about. The members of the group soon start to blame each other for the series of events leading up to her disappearance.

To a small degree there is some commentary about the roles of Iranian men and women but that is not the point of the story. This film expertly shows what happens when one lie grows larger than another and soon the entire story becomes convoluted. It is an excellent film leaving us with the thought about the little lies we tell and the consequences of such tall tales.

Louise Aronson MD, MFA is a geriatrician, author and professor of medicine at the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF) where she is chief of Geriatrics Education and holds a Gold Professorship in Humanism in Medicine. Dr. Aronson also directs the Northern California Geriatrics Education Center and UCSF Medical Humanities and sees patients in the UCSF Care at Home Program. She writes regularly for newspapers, literary and medical journals, including the *New York Times, the San Francisco Chronicle*, the *New England Journal of Medicine*, and the *Lancet*. Dr. Aronson is the author of the PEN America debut fiction award finalist, *A History of the Present Illness*, and was the 2014 American Geriatrics Society Clinician-Educator of the Year.


